
# The Philly School Experience Survey (PSES) is one of the best tools we have for monitoring conditions in schools across the city.

- The PSES has been administered in District, alternative, and charter schools every spring since 2014-15.
- Multiple stakeholder groups take the PSES, including students in grades 3-12, parents/guardians, teachers, support staff, and school leaders (principals & assistant principals).
- The PSES was developed using research on effective schools and school reform, particularly the extensive work done by Anthony Bryk and his colleagues (2010) at The University of Chicago Consortium on School Research.
- The PSES is a tool for school communities and their leaders to measure how their school is progressing in six core areas related to school improvement.

#### Participation rate trends in 2023-24 were mixed.

More than 95,000 stakeholders across District and alternative schools participated in the 2023-24 PSFS.

The principal/AP response declined by 22% and the teacher response rate declined by 5%. However, the student response rate increased by 3%, and rates for parents and support staff remained within one percentage point of their 2022-23 rates. Importantly, the large increase in parent/guardian response rate achieved in 2022-23 was sustained, at just 0.4 percentage points lower than 2022-23.

# Understanding the PSES: Topics, Score Calculation, and Score Interpretation

#### The PSES covers six core topics, plus additional key issues.

#### **Interpreting topic and subtopic scores**

All respondents are expressing maximum positivity on the topic, with everyone selecting the most positive response to every question.



All respondents are expressing maximum negativity on the topic, with everyone selecting the most negative response to every question.



#### **Differences in school topic/subtopic scores:**

A difference of 0.3 points represents a slight shift in school stakeholders' attitudes. For example, if just 10% of respondents shift all of their responses to the next most positive option, the topic score would increase by 0.3 points.


A difference of 1 point represents a moderate shift in school stakeholders' attitudes. If 30% of respondents were to shift all of their responses to the next most positive option, the topic score would increase by 1 point.

A difference of 2 points represents a large shift in school stakeholders' attitudes. If 60% of respondents were to shift all of their responses to the next most positive option, the topic score would increase by 2 points.



District-level year over year topic score changes tend to be much smaller than at the school level. This is due to the wide variation in trends across schools (see slide 11), with schools with increases and decreases "canceling each other out."

# Scores in the six core topics were similar to 2022-23, with the largest year-over-year change in Professional Capacity, which decreased by 0.2 points.



# This deck summarizes system-level trends, but remember that below the District averages lies an immense diversity of student, staff, and family experiences!

The system level topic score is like the surface of the water—it might seem stable over time...

...but under the surface, there is plenty of churn! There are often large swings in perceptions at individual schools, especially in School Leadership, Climate, and Professional Capacity (see slide 10).

School averages also hide variation in experiences within schools. The experiences of students, staff and parents/guardians can vary widely and change considerably from year to year.



### While aggregate topic scores did not change much from 2022-23 to 2023-24, there was much more fluctuation at the school level.






This figure shows the year-over-year change in topic scores from 2022-23 to 2023-24.




### While the overall School Climate score was 6.4 in both 2022-23 and 2023-24, trends varied for different subtopics within School Climate.



#### 2023-24 School Climate scores varied by school, ranging from 4.6 to 8.4.



# The degree and direction of change in School Climate scores compared to 2022-23 also varied widely by school.






This figure shows how much the School Climate scores changed for each school from 2022-23 to 2023-24.




# After two years of decline, the student-reported Supportive Classrooms subtopic recovered 0.2 points in 2023-24.



#### Instructional Environment scores varied by by school, ranging from 6.0 to 9.1.



# There were more schools with increases in Instructional Environment scores in 2023-24 than with decreases, but most schools saw changes of less than 0.5 points.



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
# On average, teachers in District and alternative schools had more negative perceptions of School Leadership in 2023-24 than the previous year.



#### School Leadership scores varied widely by school, ranging from 4.3 to 9.2.




#### School Leadership trends from 2022-23 to 2023-24 varied widely by school.




<sup>\*</sup>Two schools had School Leadership score increases greater than 3.0 (one increased by 4.8, one by 4.0). One school had a School Leadership score decline of more than 3.0 (-3.2 points). Schools must have an Instructional Environment topic score in both 2022-23 and 2023-24 in order to show a change in topic score.


# While the Teacher Collaboration score was the same as in 2022-23, Support for Innovation and School-Based Professional Development scores declined.



#### Professional Capacity scores varied by school, ranging from 3.5 to 9.1.



### There were more schools with decreases in Professional Capacity scores in 2023-24 than with increases.






This figure shows how much Professional Capacity scores changed for each school from 2022-23 to 2023-24.



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
#### Family Engagement Score subtopics continued to increase in 2023-24.



#### Family Engagement scores varied in 2023-24, ranging from 4.8 to 8.4.




#### Family Engagement scores increased for most schools in 2023-24.



# While the overall Diversity, Equity and Inclusion score was the same as in 2022-23, year-over-year trends varied by subtopic.



### Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion scores varied slightly by school, ranging from 6.5 to 8.7.



### Although the aggregate DEI score was the same as in 2022-23, there was a mix of increased and decrease scores among schools.
